Special Events Committee Update

The special events that are scheduled for 1999, and the committees that are putting them all together have been meeting and planning over the last few weeks. The Lotus Fashion Show committee (Julie Wilcher and Janice Fullard, among others) now has a date and a venue for the first fashion show sponsored by the Lotus Academy. It will be held on Saturday, April 10, 1999, at the North American Motor Inn at 4444 City Line Avenue from 11 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., with lunch being served from 12 noon to 1:00 p.m.

Speakers and workshop coordinators are being lined up for the African-Centered Education Conference to be held at the Lotus Academy on May 21-22, 1999. Invitations to potential participants will be mailed out in late January, along with a brochure which will provide details about the conference itself. We hope that the parent body will be well represented at this most important event, as many of the workshops will cover topics that are important to healthy parenting.

As the students, parents, and teachers begin to sharpen the presentations that will take place at the Oratorical Contest, the Event Program Book committee will commence its efforts with the program book for this time honored event. The program book will include much of the material that the students will be presenting at the Oratorical Contest, and it will also feature text and photos from this event over the years. It will be on sale at LaSalle University on the day of the contest finals, February 28th.

The Capital Campaign Committee will begin its work the first week of January. Letters will be mailed to our patrons, supporters, and alumni with the plans that Lotus has for upgrading its students' computers, building a scholarship fund, and improving the physical plant. The financial goals will be announced then.

Year-Round Education Update

Approximately sixty questionnaires were received from parents. They were analyzed by the Lotus staff, and formed the basis for the first meeting on Tuesday, December 22nd, to discuss the issues surrounding this proposal. In addition, the administrative and teaching staff met on December 17th to talk about the "pro's and con's", with the teachers also completing their own questionnaires to summarize their thoughts about the subject.

Despite the fact that the meeting on December 22nd was sparsely attended, those in attendance offered great insight into how this proposal would best work for parents. In addition to some very constructive criticism, many suggestions and alternative methods were proposed.

Though the goal of the meeting was not to make any firm decisions, there were several points about which there appeared to be a clear consensus: (1) if there is to be a year-round education program at Lotus, the exact annual calendar should be planned around the practical needs of Lotus parents; (2) the most workable way to increase the number of days available for instruction and to alleviate the very long period of "summer break" is to extend the school year somewhat past the typical June date and to look to possibly beginning the school year earlier than the traditional first or second week of September; (3) year-round education will only be worth the additional time, energy, and costs if it is able to significantly strengthen the academic program, and not just free up time for activities that are "summer camp" in nature; and (4) any such effort must be coupled with ways to make our existing program more effective, especially as it relates to science and math.

The issue of increased tuition costs was discussed in light of the fact that it is obvious that teachers would have to be compensated for the extra time that they would be in the classroom. This situation would be less burdensome on the teachers if we are able to develop a calendar which still has enough of a July-August break to allow for alternative employment for those months.

The January 5th meeting will represent an opportunity to discuss all of these points and any others that need to be raised. A final decision as to whether, when, and how we might implement year-round education will be made on or before January 8, 1999. That decision will be communicated to parents, and will be included in the mailing about the procedure for readmission applications that will go out during the second week of January.

As has been previously reported in the Lotus Lamp, the whole subject of year-round education will be **one** of the workshops available to parents at the Parent Workshops scheduled for Wednesday, January 27th. There will be other workshops (Children and the Media, Peer Pressure, Study Skills, etc.) in addition to this one.

Whether we are able to make year-round education a part of the Lotus program or not, we will continue to explore any creative possibilities for enhancing our children's education. In the competitive world that they are about to enter, we have no choice but to constantly look for ways to better prepare them for the challenges that lie ahead.

All parents should be reminded that the second and final "Year-Round" Education meeting will be held on Tuesday, January 5, 1999 at Lotus from 6:30-7:30 p.m..

The Sankofa Experience

On a Friday night in mid-December a number of Lotus staff members (and some very appreciated parents) watched the acclaimed independent movie, "Sankofa", by Haile Gerima. For those who have seen it, you certainly know that it is a very gripping and emotional movie that presents a very powerful message that has both historical and contemporary significance. Two of those who viewed the movie share their thoughts and feelings about a work which should be seen by everyone interested in the African-Centered perspective.

Sankofa was about bringing back the wisdom of the past to make changes in the future. This is what took place that Friday night in the Lotus Academy conference room. Ten of us gathered together to view the spirit-moving movie about one sister's experience of Sankofa.

A true experience of Sankofa is what needs to manifest in every African person dwelling in America. Maybe we as a people will awaken from our sleep, feel the connection, and answer the call of nation building, re-Africanizing, and respiritualizing.

Many of us talk of Africa. However, we do not "feel" her. Africa does not ooze from the pores of our mere existence. My brothers and sisters, in the spirit of Sankofa, "It is time to work". Not for self, but to work for the collective. It is time to reconnect to the ways of our righteous ancestors. To say we remember our ancestors while continuing to perpetuate the same system that destroyed them/us is heresy. In essence, you have become a traitor.

So, let your experience of Sankofa begin. Let us rebuild our nation by re -Africanizing/re-spiritualizing our center. Remember our ancestors by making the African worldview primary.

PEACE, LOVE, AND POWER

The initial scenes as I viewed the movie, depict a young woman who uses her Het Heru (Venus) energies, the seventh sphere on the tree of life, to gain fame and recognition as a model.

Mona, as I believe she was called, shows a lack of understanding and recognition of her past, her history, and her ancestry. While being pulled into the Slave Castle, she is yelling, "I ain't no Afrikan. I'm Mona. I'm a model. You've seen me. You've seen my pictures. I'm American. I'm from America! I AIN'T NO AFRIKAN!"

Mona uses sensual behavior, which is common in the modeling scenario today, to gain the attention of a captive audience. This behavior is derived through imitation.

Much of our learning is associated with the ninth sphere on the tree of life and gained through indiscriminate imitation. As children, we are not partial to whom we copy or mock. Usually it is someone who is very close to us, such as a parent or care giver. As adults, our interests widen, but we become more selective about whom we decide to imitate.

As we get further into the movie, Mona is forced to SANKOFANIZE her image. She is taken back through time to make that necessary connection with her ancestors. Her spirit is returned to a Southern plantation as a person born into slavery. She is called "Shola", and then the story begins...


The Early Learning Center will be holding an Open House at the new building
